



Native Trees in Landscaping

Our native landscapes are often built around large trees which form a sheltering canopy for an understory of smaller trees, shrubs, and herbaceous ground-covering plants. We want our canopy-forming trees to grow large and healthy, but many factors affect their growth and health. Drawing on his



experience as a consulting forester and Certified Arborist, Richard Baily will explain some of the variables that affect the growth of trees in the landscape. Richard earned a B.S. in Forest Resources and Conservation at the University of Florida in 1977. He has held forestry related positions at the Florida Division of Forestry and at Tampa Electric, and now has his own consulting firm. (Cont. on page 2)

PLANT PROFILE

Common name: Cutleaf evening primrose

Botanical name: *Oenothera laciniata* Hill

Engilse ONA CRA CRA F. (Francisco

Family: ONAGRACEAE (Evening

primrose Family)

Plant habit: low and spreading herb

Size: stems 1-2 ft. long

Leaves: 1-2 in. long, alternate, margins usually deeply lobed, rarely sub-entire **Flower:** yellow, about 1 in. across, 4 petals, 4 sepals, 4 stigmas, 8 stamens,

sessile in the upper leaf axils

Fruit: a cylindric capsule developing below the flower (inferior ovary) Flowering time: spring, summer and

sporadically throughout the year; the flowers opening in the evening and turning a copper color as they close in the

heat of the next day

Habitat: dry soil

Distribution: central and north Florida

Hardiness zones: cold hardy

Availability: Some native plant nurseries



Light: full sun

Water: Drought tolerant once established

Propagation: by seed
