## Rare Plant Conservation Update Presented by Juliet Rynear Wednesday, August 20, 2014, 7 PM

One of the most unique ecosystems in the world is in central Florida, the Lake Wales Ridge, a sandy scrub area, is home to many plants found nowhere

else. The biologists at Bok Tower are studying and working to preserve some of these rare local species. They also work on some plants in conjunction with the Center for Plant Conservation, based in St. Louis. About 64 of Florida's rarest plant species are housed at Bok Tower Gardens. SNPS members have helped with some of these efforts - Carmel vanHoek helps with the annual bellflower survey and several people have helped with the *Chrysopsis floridana* propagation, restoration and monitoring project. Juliet will give us updates on the status of some of the plants being conserved as part of Bok Tower's mission.

Juliet Rynear is the Rare Plant Specialist at Bok Tower Gardens in Lake Wales, Florida. Her work in the Rare Plant Conservation Program includes research on Florida's rare plants and their habitats and the development of protocols for nursery propagation and introduction of new

populations onto protected lands. She is also Chair of the Conser-

vation Committee for FNPS.

Our meetings include light refreshments and a native plant auction after the speaker. We have many knowledgeable members who will help you with your native plant questions. Please come and join us.

#### **Letter from the President**

#### Make it Easy!

Whoever developed the recent Staples commercials is a genius! It's okay for die-hard native plant people to over complicate this whole thing about native plants, analyzing each one to determine its genus and specific traits, but for the average homeowner looking for some plants for their yard so they can attract butterflies, all they want is Easy. They want to hit the Easy button and know where they can go, grab a few plants, plop them in the ground and wait for their favorite flitting flyers to arrive.

Our job is to make it easy for them to accomplish their goal. In 45 words or less, we need to be able to teach them everything they need to know about native plants; i.e., where they can get them (preferably a drive-thru nursery), what to ask for (no Latin names, please!), where they will grow (preferably anywhere) and how to care for them ("but you said it was native and wouldn't need water"). If we can't convey all that in less than 3 minutes, we have lost our audience.

Unfortunately, this is the fast-food, fast-paced world we live in today. Gone are the ladies' garden clubs where all the members spent hours each morning trimming their roses and hydrangeas. We all have very busy lives with work, kids, family, travel, and limited time to accomplish it.

Until we can convince the nursery plant retailers to offer native plants, they won't become mainstream. And the nursery plant retailers won't carry native plants until the public knows what to ask for and demands it.

Our job is to sell, sell and sell! Convince homeowners that they need native plants and convince the plant retailers to offer them. So someday homeowners will be able to drive through their local plant retailer, say "Gimme a dozen Fire bush" and when they see they are in 1 gallon pots, say, "Supersize it, please! I want the 3 gallon pots".

#### Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition Update

The Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition 700-plus mile journey across the state of Florida is set to start on October 11, 2014. The mission of the second Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition is to raise awareness about the need to connect, protect and restore corridors of conserved lands and waters essential for the survival of Florida's diverse wildlife. To help build this awareness, a group of explorers including Conservationist Mallory Lykes Dimmitt, Biologist Joe Guthrie, Photographer Carlton Ward Jr., and Filmmaker Elam Stoltzfus will be walking, paddling or biking their way more than 700 miles from the Everglades Headwaters in Central Florida, across the Panhandle to the Alabama border.

The Corridor team and partners advocate for the protection of the "missing links," roughly two million acres of highest priority lands still in need of protection to ensure the long-term viability of the Corridor. The Corridor provides habitat for 42 federally listed endangered species and 176 state listed endangered species. Some endangered species include the Whooping Crane, Florida Panther, West Indian Manatee, Green Turtle, Leatherback Turtle, Hawksbill Turtle, Gulf Sturgeon and many more.

#### **Hernando Chapter Meeting**

The September 8th program will feature Jim King, Conservation Lands Specialist from Hernando County's Environmentally Sensitive Lands Program presenting a talk and slide show on habitat restoration at Cypress Lakes Preserve. The County recently completed a three year plan for restoring the scrub and sand hill communities which had become overgrown with hardwoods in the absence of natural fires. Treatments to reduce hardwood size and density included: mulching with machinery; cutting with chain saws and painting stumps with herbicide; and, hand saw and chain saw cutting of small trees and brush by volunteers. Three years of hardwood reduction were followed by a controlled burn in May 2013, which stimulated low growing plants, particularly flowering herbaceous species. It hasn't all been pretty, but the wildflowers have been spectacular and the gopher tortoises have enjoyed their best food supply in decades. The transformation is amazing.

The Sept 8 Hernando chapter meeting is at 6:30, Chinsegut Hill, 22495 Chinsegut Hill Rd., Brooksville, FL. 34601. For a map and additional information, go to www.HCFNPS.org.

Jim is a native Floridian, born and raised in Panama City in the Florida panhandle. He graduated from Bay County High School, attended the University of Florida, and graduated with a degree of Bachelor of Science in Forestry, majoring in Wildlife Ecology. He is currently the land manager for Hernando County's Environmentally Sensitive Lands (ESL) Program.

On October 18th, Jim will join both the Hernando and Suncoast Chapters of the Florida Native Plant Society for a field trip to Cypress Lakes Preserve to see first hand the results of this habitat restoration.


#### Places to see Plants

#### Alderman Ford Preserve

8911 Turkey Creek Rd, Durant, FL

A few miles west from Alderman Ford Park is a 970 acre preserve of the same name. Alderman Ford Preserve is protected under the Hillsborough County Environmental Lands Acquisition and Protection Program (ELAPP). The preserve has a well maintained



with vines and lichen.



I have hiked Alderman Ford Preserve at least a half dozen times. The site is well managed with periodic burns. My last hike, at the end of May, was limited to the uplands, where I saw an abundance of spring flowers and

pollinators. At the trail head, open pinewoods were dotted with beautiful blue spiderworts. As I walked further


west, there was a field carpeted with purple passion vine and a host of gulf fritillary butterflies. Other butterflies I saw were the Variegated Fritillary, Great Southern Whites, Fiery Skippers, Grey Hairstreaks and American Ladies.



Here are just a few of the native spring wildflowers I saw:

- 1. Spiderwort, Tradescantia ohiensis
- 2. Grassleaf Lettuce, Lactuca graminfolia
- 3. Meadowbeauty, Rhexia spp
- 4. Purple Passionflower, Passiflora incarnata
- 5. Spanish Needles, Bidens alba
- 6. Grassleaf Roseling, Callisia graminea
- 7. Roserush, Lygodesmia aphylla
- 8. Prickly Pear, Opuntia humifusa
- 9. Morning Glory, Ipomoea spp
- 10. Spotted Horsemint, Monarda punctata
